Dear Friends in Christ,

How do you understand what Jesus said to the Pharisees and Herodians who plotted to kill Him: *“Repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God.”* I think that there will be no misunderstanding what Jesus meant in this response. All that we have (time, talents, treasures, health, mind, body, spirit . . .) comes from our good Lord, who sees the secrets of our heart, soul, and mind.

Do you think that we deserve to have more talents and treasures than others? Do you think that we deserve to have more good health and good spirit than others? Do you think that we can use what we have in whatever way we want, not caring of others? Do you think that all we have or possess are our own?

We as Christians and Catholics believe that all we have and possess comes from God, and God wants us to use them to *“Give the Lord glory and honor”* as the responsorial Psalm from this 29<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time says.

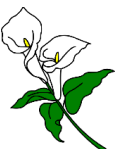
When we have time to relax, we often say that we deserve it; when we are successful in life by using our talents (which actually were given to us for nothing and from above), we want to get full credit for it. When we have more treasure, we do not ask, *“HOW did we get the treasure?”*, and if we do, I think we feel more guilt before God’s justice! We often keep the treasure for ourselves; we become selfish.

Whatever God has given to us, He wants us to use first for His glory and honor, then for the good of our brothers and sisters. Actually, God does not need any glory because He is so perfect; our offering, praises, and worshipping do not bring any more glory to Him, but they are for the sake of our soul, redemption, and salvation. When we use the gifts given to us, free gifts to help our brothers and sisters in need, we do honor God like Jesus said, *“When you give a glass of water to one of the least of my brothers, you do it to me.”*

Friends, today and days after, may we use God’s free gifts for glory and honor to God. God must be above in everything we do and say. The day you and I stand before God, He might ask us: *“Did you give to me what belong to me?”* Or *“Did you fulfill your obligation in using my gifts that I gave you freely?”* Or *“Did you ever say thanks to me for what you received?”* How would we answer God? Remember, you and I cannot *“LIE”* or *“DECEIVE”* Him?

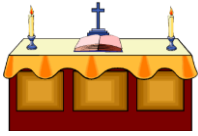

**Diocesan Requirements for Reporting Ministry-Related Sexual Abuse of a Minor:** Any individual having actual knowledge of or reasonable cause to suspect an incident of ministry-related sexual abuse is to immediately report the incident to the Chancery.



After the incident is reported, the Chancery will then report the incident to the proper civil authorities. The individual reporting the incident to the Chancery will be notified of the particulars regarding the Chancery's filing of the incident with the civil authorities. The reporting is not intended to supersede the right of an individual to make a report to civil authorities, but is to ensure proper, complete and timely reporting. Should an individual choose to make a report to civil authority, a report is still to be made to the Chancery.
