Dear Friends in Christ,

The Fourth Sunday of Easter is called "The Good Shepherd" Sunday because in the Gospel of this Sunday our Risen Christ calls Himself the Good Shepherd, who is ready to lay down his life for the sheep.

 \mathcal{M} any things have rocked the Church, but they cannot destroy the Church which is built by the Risen Christ Himself. We realize that the church needs more good shepherds who would be molded as the Good Shepherd Jesus Christ.

With what is going on in our world, our society and our Church, we might think that it is not easy to have good and holy shepherds for the Church. I, however, always firmly believe that the Catholic Church, which is built BY JESUS CHRIST on the Rock, Peter, will stand firm to the end, to the time that Jesus Christ the Builder will come back in glory. No matter what happens to the Church caused by any forces from inside or outside, I will stand firm and remain in the Catholic Church. I encourage you to do the same with grace from God, who initiates every grace and blessing for us and to us.

The Good Shepherd Jesus Christ will provide for the needs of His Church and protect it and keep it in the truth.

Dear friends in Christ, keep your faith, practice it with love and courage. Do not try to "converse" with the devil. Develop your "prayer life." Love and support and protect your "shepherd." Encourage and pray for your priest and also forgive him. Prepare yourself worthily (at least not having mortal sin) to receive the Holy Eucharist. Sacrifice your time; make more effort to attend daily Mass. Do not kill the seed of vocation to the Priesthood from young boys/men/ your sons/your grandsons, and so forth. I ask you to do these with love for Christ, our Risen Lord, and His Church.

God will provide. Yet we must do our part! Actually, in our country there are now more young men applying to enter the seminaries with a zeal for the works of God. I am still praying that one or two of our Altar Servers will discern the vocation to the priesthood. Could you join me?

May God send more good and holy shepherds to the Church. May many young men respond generously and courageously to the call from God in serving Him and His people as good and holy priests. Amen.

Does it matter what you wear to Mass?

 ${\mathcal W}$ hen you wake up in the morning, how do you decide what to wear? Most of us take into account what is happening that day, who will be there, and what the goal of the day is. Whether it is for work at the office, a date, a wedding, a hike, or staying at home, we dress accordingly. So, when it comes to Sunday Mass, we should dress accordingly. If Mass matters, then what we wear matters. But what does that look like? If you have not thought about it in a while, here are a few guidelines to help you choose what to wear to Mass.

 ${\mathcal B}$ efore deciding what to wear at Mass, think about the event. What is happening? Mass is about worshiping God. It is important enough that Catholics are required to go every week. We believe that a miracle happens every Mass wherein our God comes to us in the Eucharistic, the real presence of Our Lord, Jesus. So, it makes sense to dress up for Mass more than you would for say, a sporting event or a day of errands. questions and concerns, seeking spiritual direction and guidance.

On the one hand, it does not matter if you look terrible or amazing - Mass will go on. But on the other hand, be wary of investing too much effort into how you look at Mass. Do not wear something to purposefully draw attention to yourself. Be respectful of the other people attending Mass, and dress for what you are doing: **praising God**.
