Dear Friends in Christ,

The first message that Jesus preached when He began His public ministry is coming to us today: “Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.”

Repent. We are all called to repent, however, there is one preceding step of repentance; that is **“recognizing that we have sinned.”** This tendency to sin is present in every one; that is one of the consequences of original sin: “(Someone) made me do it!”

Repentance is what Jesus called us to do because the kingdom of heaven is at hand. Repentance is necessary to see, recognize and enter the kingdom of heaven. Many see, but do not recognize. Many recognize, but are not able to enter the kingdom of heaven.

Repentance is being sorry for our sins and also an effort to amend our life. Repentance includes words (Lord, I am sorry, forgive my sins) and actions (confession and intention to avoid the occasions of sin).

God so loved the world! He is ready to say to those who come to Him with repentance (God knows who is playing “games” with Him; God knows who is sincere in repenting) that “Your sins are forgiven.”

Therefore, be humble before God; have courage to come to Him; to trust in His love and power. Knowing that God had given the power to forgive sin to His Church, so trust in the Church that Jesus built on the rock, Peter, who holds the keys to heaven!

In reality, Satan does not leave us alone. He tries many ways to make us doubt, fearful, confused. He might even remind us that “God loves you so much, so He will not punish you for eternity just because of one “small” sin.” Don’t you remember that we have free-will, that we are totally free to make our decision saying yes or no to God, that we are totally responsible/accountable for every action we have done before the Almighty God, that we should not “blame” Satan alone for our evil/immoral/disobedient acts? Satan and the devils tempt us, but we are the ones to decide, not Satan or the devils. We have FREE-WILL.

Jesus established the Church, so the Church will continue to preach this message: REPENT. The Apostles had been called and sent to spread this message. The priests have been called and sent for this message (by the virtues of Baptism and Sacred Order). The Laity have been called and sent for this message (by the virtues of Baptism and the preaching of ordained ministers).

Let us pray fervently to God to send more laborers for His harvest. Let us also pray that many will listen to God’s message through their teaching and preaching, and be able to return to God and the Church.
